

Long-Term Unemployment Rate for Nevada is Trending with the Nation



- Information from the monthly Current Population Survey (CPS), sponsored by the Census Bureau and the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) enables the analysis of the long-term unemployment rate (LTUR) in Nevada in the goods producing industries, and service providing industries. Long-term unemployment is defined as being unemployed for 27 weeks or more.
- From 1999 through the end of 2008 the LTUR in Nevada averaged 0.6 percent, and the unemployment rate averaged 4.3 percent. In August 2019 the LTUR for the state was 0.8 percent unchanged from August 2018. The unemployment rate for the state was 4.4 percent in August 2018 decreasing to 4.0 percent in 2019.
- For the nation the average over the period from 1999 through the end of 2008 was 0.9 percent for the LTUR, and 4.6 percent for the unemployment rate. The national LTUR in August 2019 was 0.8 percent down from 0.9 percent in August 2018. Over the same time, the national unemployment rate decreased to 3.4 percent from 3.7 percent.
